Not even Storm Freya could blow the smiles off these faces at Stoke Lacy's Church's Topping Out ceremony in March. Parishioners donned their warmest layers to celebrate at the ceremony for the renovation work on the spire of St Peter's and St Paul's Church.

Vernon Amor, MD of Wye Valley Brewery, was the guest of honour thanks to the brewery's generous donation towards the regilding of the weathervane. Vernon toured the site to inspect the great work on the new beautifully shingled spire and to see the improvements inside the bell tower.

While only the Reverend Clive Evans and Stoke Lacy Heritage Lead, John Davies, were brave/foolhardy enough to go all the way up, parishioners joined them on the first stage of the scaffolding. Among the brave first base mountaineers were Janet Parker (83 years) and Colin Simmonds (78 years). Previously the village's own Daphne Montandon (80 years) went all the way up with a couple of very impressed builders.

Clive and John were well supported by Mike Gammon and his building team to ensure the camera, the bird and the extra, but essential, step ladder got to the top safely. Not sure if it was the weather conditions but some very special glue was needed to ensure the bird didn't get blown away before the final important photograph.

It was an amazing moment for the SLHP team. Twelve months ago a broken church. Now, one HLF grant and a hugely successful fund-raising effort later, a brand-new refurbished spire and tower. John Davies said "We are ecstatic that this first phase of the project has gone so smoothly and so quickly". Reverend Clive praised Mike Gammon and his team for being so efficient and for being such great fun to work with. He said, "The getting up was fine, it was the staying upright which was the problem! Cold Mad March gales were blowing but four of us, Mike and Malcolm our builders, John Davies and I managed to do the biz. The cockerel looks fantastic and not surprisingly, once in position, immediately swung into action: Strong winds from the SW! It was a fitting way to crown all the excellent work which Mike and his team have been doing: a wonderful job! Well done and thank you."

After this great achievement, the project team are looking forward to the next stage of the project on their "to-do" list as work begins on the nave roof. Look out for details of the next big fundraiser the Morgan 110th festival on 6th July.





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
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STOKE LACY PARISH COUNCIL

An extra-ordinary meeting took place on Wednesday 27th February about the Newlands Development, on which building began in January.

Present: Councillor Janet Ivison (Chairman); Councillors
Anne Reece, Helen Bufton and John Westwood. In
attendance were: - Mrs Alma Westwood (Clerk)
Ward Councillor Jonathan Lester; CSO Susan Berrett, PCSO
Jack Davies, 29 members of the public

Questions raised regarding the Newlands Development with Mr Mark Battin, Assistant Development Manager, and Mr Jonathan Mullins, Head of Land & Planning, of Sanctuary Housing.

i. Speed was the main issue. Highways had approved Sanctuary Housing's plans; unlikely the 30mph limit would be extended (the Chairman said it was hoped it would be extended to Stoke Lane). A reduction to the Cricks Green speed limit would have a beneficial effect on reducing overall speed in the area.

ii There had been no co-ordination between the Newlands and Orchard development sites; the County Council did not usually do this between smaller developments.

iii Jonathan Mullins would come back to the Clerk over the question of working hours; inconsiderate hours had been noted by residents.

iv Sewage disposal, and possible contamination of storm water drainage: concerns were raised by members of the public that the arrangements agreed with Welsh Water would not be adequate. There was no mains sewage system through Stoke Lacy.

Messrs Battin and Mullins assured the meeting that 104 Drainage Approval had been granted, but the Clerk was instructed to contact Welsh Water requesting a spokesperson attend the next Parish Council meeting to clarify the situation

v Jonathan Mullins would speak to the contractors about the maintenance of the ditches on Newlands, between the development and Crossfield House, and along the private drive, and would liaise with Ms Horsnett

vi Mr Battin and Mr Mullins were asked to ensure that checks were in place so that residents could be reassured that agreed levels for gardens and housing were correct. vii No street lighting would be installed

viii Heating to be by air source heat pumps

ix The original hedge line would be re-planted and the site landscaped (see plans)

x The first homes would be ready in June
xi The name of the development will be Newlands
xii There were no plans for a shop or more buses. There
would be a footpath to the The Plough and village hall
xiii Samples of proposed bricks were shown, which met
with approval

Levels: Councillor Lester said it was imperative that Mr Battin and the Planning Department met to ensure levels

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
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
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were correct from the outset. He would be following this up.

19.16 Representative from Welsh Water

Mr Rhys Evans, Planning Manager from Welsh Water, was welcomed and invited to speak.

Mr Evans explained that the sewerage network and capacity of the system and treatment works having been looked at, Welsh Water was confident that there was capacity to take foul (not surface) water. Surface water was the concern of Herefordshire Council/Balfour Beattie. He showed a map of the sewerage system and where new pipework would connect to it, in the main road

(CSO Berrett and CSO Davies left the meeting at 7.50pm)

Following many questions, Mr Evans re-iterated that whilst he appreciated everyone's concerns Welsh Water would not allow further connections unless it was completely satisfied that there was sufficient capacity to cope. The Company would be heavily fined if there was pollution. An up-to-date review of the system had been carried out on site as a requirement, whilst investment in infrastructure was carried out every 5 years.

He asked that anyone with concerns about smell or other issues report it to Head Office. If necessary, an upgrade would be carried out then. He would email the Clerk with a map of the system and some contact Welsh Water details.

The Chairman thanked Mr Evans for attending

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NEW DELUXE HOUSING IN STOKE LACY – FOR BIRDS



Local residents and visitors will soon see a number of specially made bird boxes on trees around Stoke Lacy Churchyard. It is hoped that these new homes will attract a variety of birds into the churchyard and surrounds. This Wild Life Conservation initiative forms part of the Heritage Lottery Project for refurbishment of the church steeple and roof of St Peter and St Paul Church, Stoke Lacy.

Alma Westwood and Richard Combe, church wardens, are showing off samples of the different types and sizes of nest boxes, which include homes for blue tits, coal tits, great tits, robins, fly catchers and a massive box for a tawny owl. Richard, who made the prototypes, is hoping that some keen handyman (or indeed a team of people!) will come forward to help him make more. Stoke Lacy and District Gardening Club

22nd January 2019 "Gardening for Wildlife" - a talk by Rosemary Winnall

On a cold winter's evening there was a good turn out to hear Rosemary talk on the subject which is her passion. She told us how her garden developed, using photographs to illustrate the balance between formal and wild areas and the way the different parts of the garden flowed into each other. Using keen observation and photography she records the creatures that visit. A wide and diverse range from badgers to tiny insects. This information she shares with local and national organisations, adding to the scientific knowledge of the delicate balance in the world for which we have a responsibility. Her passion and curiosity was inspiring and I for one will in future pay more attention to what goes on right under my nose.

26th February 2019 "The Bumblebee" - a talk by Claire Piper from the Bumblebee Conservation Trust

Most people think of the honeybee as the most important pollinator but in fact it is the bumblebee. There are 24 different species of bumblebee in this county, 8 of which are still common. Each species is specially adapted to collect nectar from different shaped flowers and their furry bodies are good for collecting pollen. With the changes in agriculture and the decline of wildflowers in our countryside, gardens are now vital for bee's survival. Bumblebee queens hibernate over winter and emerge in early spring, they need to rebuild their strength and prepare to start a new colony so will be looking for flowers rich in pollen and nectar at this time of year. Bumblebees are not aggressive and male bees cannot sting. As gardeners we can help the bumblebees by providing them with flowers rich in nectar and pollen especially in Autumn and early spring. St Peter's & St Paul's Church: From the Vicar:

An Easter tale about a whale: what a whoppa! What has Easter got to do with Jonah and the Whale? We all know the Bible story of Jonah the prophet who ran away from God, went on a boat trip, hit a big storm, got thrown overboard and, in the process of sinking, ended up being swallowed by a great fish. (The fish finally vomited him out on to dry land whereupon he got on with the business God had planned for him in the first place: but that's another story!)

Along with Noah and the Ark, and Joseph and his coat of many colours, Jonah is great material for a children's popup story book. But it has many other dimensions and lessons for all ages: some of them very dark. In chapter 2 Jonah describes his ordeal: thrown overboard, then sinking, sinking; deeper and deeper into the abyss. It reminds me of the horror of the watery death of drowning portrayed so powerfully in films like *Titanic*. Jonah puts it like this: 'all your waves and breakers swept over me...the deep surrounded me...I sank down.' Maybe you can relate to this kind of experience, either in your own life or in the life of someone close to you. It could be the experience of some kind of tragedy, or loss, a bereavement, accident or coming to terms with bad news. Or death. We're just overwhelmed. Whether it's something we've faced ourselves or something we've shared in, darkness can seem like our closest friend, as one of the Psalms has it.

Jesus experienced this darkness. Just before he was crucified, he said to his friends, 'My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death'. And, according to the gospels, as he was dying, darkness covered the land for three hours. Words are wholly inadequate to describe such moments. And things just seemed to get worse.

It was at this point beyond despair that something extraordinary happened. Jesus was raised from death. Darkness was shattered by blazing light. The end became a completely unexpected beginning. Bad news was turned into good news. It was nothing short of a miracle! Funny old Jonah had a foretaste of resurrection: he's 'saved' by the fish. From inside the fish, he praises God for his mighty deliverance (somewhat bizarrely, you might think!). He understands that he has passed from death to life and so he points forward to the moment when God would do the ultimate work of resurrection in the person of Jesus.

Not so much about bunnies and chocolate but about reallife issues, things we all face sooner or later, more or less. Easter answers the question: Can there be any hope? Simply: yes.

Whether it's Jesus or Jonah, in short God is in the business of transformation, of restoration. His purpose, always, is to bring life out of death and we can confidently put our trust in him not to give us a pass out of the hard things of life but to lead us through them, to a better place. Ultimately, that is supremely going to be heaven: where we will enjoy his company forever.

But it is also about the here and now. Maybe you are in that dark place right now where all your hope has gone. Don't despair: put your hope in God who raised Jesus from the grave. Saving people is what God does best, using whales if necessary.

Letter to the editor

Transport Consultation January 29th to March 11th

As has been the case for any number of years, our rural bus services are yet again under threat. The local council seems to cut subsidies every year and we who rely on them to get to work have the same situation and worry annually. Some of us do not drive and a bus is a necessity. We hear much of 'the needs of school children' and 'Pensioners stranded' and such like. But what of the likes of me, who needs to work, and cannot get there any other way? Trains are expensive — prohibitively so — and would eat up about a third of my income if I used this transport method.

In 2015, First Midland Red saw fit to close the Hereford bus station, sacking all their drivers and leaving it to the local privately-run bus companies to fill the gap. DRM Buses seems to have the most cover locally and by and large do a reasonable job; except when arbitrarily cutting a route without consultation and very little warning. Every July we have to wait to find out what buses are still running in August.

For example, both First Bus and DRM both used to run an early route into and from Hereford, coming from Hereford it would pass my house and I could catch it to work in Worcester. Either bus. And the same coming home.

Now, neither DRM or First Bus operate an early service from / to Hereford.

In order to get to Worcester in time for work my partner has to drive me in to Bromyard to catch the 7.22 First Bus. There is no DRM service until about 10:00, again from Bromyard. We passengers have little or no say in which routes remain or are cut and often only find out about them through hearsay and rumour.

We are encouraged to use public transport. How do we do this when the service is consistently slashed through council budgets cuts? And what of all the new builds going up around Herefordshire and Worcestershire? Will all the people occupying these drive, I wonder? Villages and Towns without Neighbourhood Plans are being forced to accept large numbers of housing. Often whole estates, without any consideration given to the travel needs of those who will occupy them. Local infrastructure, such as it is, is groaning at the seams already.

It seems to me that buses should be a *service* and not something subject to the whims of councillors who have no idea about the rigours of everyday life and rarely, if ever, need to catch a bus. The rural economy is such that there are few jobs, unless one is prepared to pick

strawberries or shovel muck for a pittance. I would not choose to travel for work for more than 3 hours every day if there were more choices open to me.

I would very much like to see regular and reliable buses between Hereford and Worcester (starting early), which run at sensible times for individuals such as myself to get to work and back, without all the unnecessary stress currently endured. I would also like to see proper and regular maintenance of the roads – and the buses – since potholes make for uncomfortable travel (a whole other subject being the costs involved).

I am unhappy we seem to be a third world country in terms of public transport, one half expects to find the buses full of chickens with suitcases strapped to the roof-Berlin and Athens are shining examples of what can be done with a little thought and effort by those who make these lazy decisions and spend our money.

I trust this will all be taken into consideration, though a public consultation does not give me great confidence that anything positive will result. I have been trying to get comments and improvements.
